Meet Tucker



In an endeavor to get to know our membership we are going to do a story on one member in each newsletter. This month we are going to introduce you to Tucker!! The information for this story was supplied by Royden Simpson. Royden knows Tucker very, very well. Probably better than just about anyone in the club. He has worked with Tucker one-on-one many, many times. Our own editor, Jim Foster, has taken Royden's words and written this story so you too can "meet Tucker".

Many ACTB members, especially our newcomers, hear us old-timers talking about TUCKER and wonder who he is and why he is so important.

Tucker isn't a he, it's an it! It's our 1978 Sno Cat Tucker Model 1342, made in Portland Oregon, the machine that grooms our fabulous winter trail system with the help of its volunteer pilots.

This thing weighs about three tons and is an impressive 22 feet long. When we first got our Tucker, the hour meter read 4,297.1 hours, but it hadn't worked for years so we installed a new engine this year and after this past winter the meter now shows 188.3 hours -- that's a lot of grooming for you, our members, in just one winter!

This machine is 30 years old and takes a lot of tender lovin' care. When grooming, it runs at 3/4 throttle all the time and works very hard, especially with multiple drivers which is harder on the machine as each has their own style of operating the machine.

It takes about 300 man hours per year just in maintenance to keep her going and this does not even include grooming time. Maintenance takes special tools, cutting torches, an electric welder, jacks and jack stands, not to mention gases to run the welders. Royden Simpson just filled up his acetylene and oxygen bottles, for example, at a cost of \$109. The gas for the electric welder costs about \$115 alone!

The tucker also requires someone with a very big truck to go pick it up with an equally huge trailer when it breaks. A half-ton isn't nearly big enough as it takes a lot of power to haul it, and sometimes the large, heavy drag is on it, too.

The Tucker should be maintained in a heated garage which allows for the ice and snow to melt off, which allows the maintenance guys to see other things on the machine that might be broken, and to give it a good greasing, too.

Now you know who Tucker is!

Grooming



During the June meeting the board of directors learned that the winter vs summer membership ratio was at 50/50. That is a very interesting thing. Travis, who was in charge of memberships for many years up until this year, reported that the ratio always used to be one which showed less winter memberships in the count. Now that there are more ATVs out there in the winter time grooming is more and more important.

It is important that we as members understand what goes on in our grooming season. Our groomer, as you have learned, is an older model Tucker, one which has been treated and coaxed along over the years. Each year the expenses of maintaining it become more and more, and the man hours required are more and more. We have been lucky over the past several years and have had Royden Simpson as the head of maintenance. He has put in countless hours year after year maintaining it. This year Royden is taking a much deserved rest. He will still be working on the machine as his schedule allows but will be handing over the reigns as head of maintenance to someone else.

What we all do not realize is that with Royden as head of maintenance we have always enjoyed the luxury of his garage, and his tools at our disposal. This year we are attempting to get a building - "tucker shed" - on our property in Dawson to both house and maintain the tucker. There are fundraising efforts underway every day put on by the hard working Land Committee to this end. One which I might add for interest's sake, Royden is a member of.

The entire grooming committee is manned by volunteers. Travis who is the dispatcher has been doing this for many years. He is extremely good at it and knows what needs to be done, and when it needs doing. Working with the groomer operators he makes sure we have groomed trails whenever possible. He knows what type of snow can adequately be groomed, what temperatures the best grooming is done under. He also is always aware of any safety issues out there. He will not send out the groomer if everything necessary for a safe groom is not in place. Travis does not just guess at this, he knows because he has been involved in grooming for many, many years. He has also put countless hours into grooming himself, so we need to trust his judgment in this matter.

I have had the opportunity to listen as members and non-members each vent their frustrations at grooming not having been done at a certain time or that the snowmobile club has groomed and we have not. Let us all understand that conditions on the mountain are not always mirrored in areas where our trails are. Not only that, there are not always volunteers available to man the tucker, or there may be a maintenance or safety issue we are not aware of. Rest assured if it is possible to groom, the trails are groomed and when it is not they are not. Please be patient this coming winter and give the grooming/maintenance crews a big pat on the back next time you see one of them. It is their countless VOLUNTEER hours which give us the ability to ride the trails in the winter time. Trust your grooming committee.

One more thing remember that the winter season costs are fueled by winter memberships. Please pick yours up as soon as you can once they become available. That allows us the ability to plan the season as early as possible. Thank you all.

Clubs which do not groom will be able to sell winter memberships however, the extra \$50.00 will be turned into the federation and they will distribute it evenly between the clubs within the zone in which the club is located. If there are no winter grooming clubs within their zone the federation will distribute it among the closest zone.
